

The **Immigration and Border Dialogues Conference** is organized by **Bridges Not Walls**, a group of concerned community members from the South Sound area and beyond who have united in solidarity, and are building a human rights movement in order to realize a sustainable future for all.

This conference examines barriers, real or perceived, that divide our communities. Together we will examine current realities faced by immigrants, explore inclusive approaches to immigration, and create space for the emergence of a more just and humane future.

Participants will leave this conference with specific bridge-building strategies to reclaim our common humanity and build multicultural alliances across age, gender, culture, ethnicity, and legal status with the key-stones of mutual respect and support.

Our program includes presenters from human rights organizations working both regionally and along the US/Mexico border, and includes panel discussions, speakers, workshops, seminars, theater, art, and music.

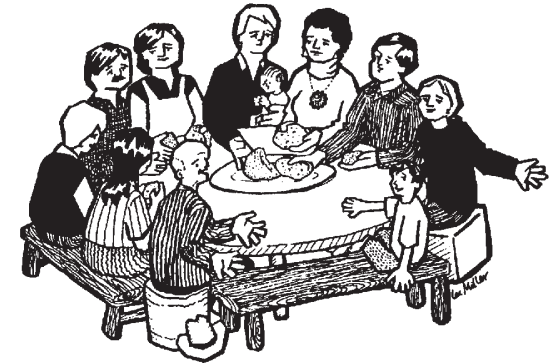
