

### Resolution No 06-312 Establishing a Cultural Heritage Special Committee

The DuPont City Council's Strategic Plan at Goal 6 calls for the active protection of historic sites and artifacts, and DMC 25.80 encourages recognition and enhancement of our cultural heritage.

The City of DuPont Resolution 06-312 established a Cultural Heritage Committee for a period of one year. Its purpose, to investigate the current status of historical sites and archeological resources and to recommend actions that should be taken for their protection and promotion.

### Intrigue on Nisqually Point:

### New Group Contends With Giant to Preserve Historic Sites

For a year now, Lorraine Overmyer has been working with the State of Washington's Office of Archaeology & Historic Preservation to create a historic district on Nisqually Point in SW Pierce County. A retired teacher and former DuPont City Council Member, Overmyer is the most recent recipient of the State Award for Outstanding Achievement in Historical Preservation.

Weyerhaeuser, in an apparent effort to thwart Lorraine and other local residents in their attempt to create a federally recognized historic district, recently submitted a competing proposal. The Weyerhaeuser version, developed by paid consultants, is made up primarily of areas already protected by city, state, or federal mandate. Weyerhaeuser has not stated specifically why it objects to the original nomination.

In the long term, the citizens' group envisions a Heritage Park that unites Nisqually traditions: Tribal, fur trading, agriculture, military, and early industrial, all with an eye towards the natural resources that made the place particularly attractive. This area is perhaps the most important historic site in Washington State. Originally settled by the Nisqually tribe, it also includes a Hudson's Bay Company settlement area—the first Euro-American settlement on the Puget Sound, and the industrial land-scape of the 1906 E. I. duPont Company dynamite plant-first of its kind on the West Coast.

Contained within both nominations is the identified area of the 1840 Methodist Mission, first of its kind in Washington State. However, the inclusion by Weyerhaeuser drew a skeptical response from Dr. James Edgren, an area resident active in preserving the mission site. "Weyerhaeuser's recently removed a 60-year-old historic marker and dumped a load of toxic waste around the mission area," he said. "All of a sudden the area has historic value? There's something inconsistent about that!"

The state's Advisory Council on Historic Preservation will review several proposals regarding historic designation on September 24 in Spokane. If approved, a proposal will be forwarded to Washington, DC to determine if the property is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.

NDA, formed a new organization, the Nisqually Point Defense Fund. The N.P.D.F. plans to object to Weyerhaeuser's proposal being considered at the same meeting. In a notarized letter delivered to Kathy Kreiter, Acting Director of the Department of Community, Trade and, Economic Development, N.P.D.F. states that consideration by the Advisory Council would violate federal notification regulations.

In part, that letter reads: "Review cannot take place unless affected property owners have 'at least 30 days' to submit comments. At least one owner did not receive notification until August 30, only twenty-five days prior to the review meeting. Review of the Weyerhaeuser nomination must be postponed until proper notification occurs."

The same regulations were invoked to postpone consideration of the citizens' Nisqually-Sequalitchew Historic District nomination last June. Two days before the Advisory Council met, the Office of Archaeology & Historic Preservation removed the nomination from the agenda, citing questions about proper notification. These questions, it was later revealed, were unfounded.
