It's a pleasure to write this letter and tell you how my life and studies are going.

First of all I would like to give thanks to God and everyone who has made it possible for me to pur-



sue my education at Universidad Martín Lútero here in Santo Tomás. I grew up with my three sisters in the care of our grandparents. Because my father did not provide for us, my mother had to move far away to find work to send money to her parents to feed us. I survived with the help of God and my family. I am anxious to start my career, so my mother can finally retire and I can give back some of what she did for me. I will serve my community here with everything I have.

I am studying to be a public school teacher and am in the last semester of the five year program. I am doing well academically, but some of my studies have imposed real hardships on me. Two years ago, I took a class called PROJECT. It was really difficult because it was challenging to find the information for the theoretical part and I had to buy the professional suit necessary to present my findings, food for the jury that reviewed my defense, print the documents, etc. God helped me and I was able to pass the class.

Once I graduate in August of this year and secure a job, I hope to continue my studies with a specialization. I am told that after earning my Bachelor's degree, I will need to study something more specific to have a better chance at finding a permanent job in the educational field. Wish me well! 
Over 25 Years of hermanamiento with Santo Tomás

Some excerpts from a speech written by Jean Eberhardt and delivered by Evergreen students at the public anniversary celebration on April 11 in Santo Tomás:

On this special occasion, with the brothers and sisters of Mol, Belgium, we observe another anniversary with

the people of Santo Tomás and the Committee for Commu-

nity Development. Just over 25 years ago, people in Olympia created a non-profit organization, with the love and energy of many people volunteering to strengthen solidarity ties with Nicaragua through our relationship with Santo Tomás.



Significant historical context was shared and then followed by:

It was a privilege to be with you and develop our consciousness, with the goal of ending U.S. aggression and the *contra* war, and experiencing in our bodies the meaning of solidarity: the accompaniment and how much we learned from the exchange of ideas, the mutual respect, the songs, the shared work shoulder to shoulder, the pain as well as the moments of happiness, the loss of our loved ones and the victories...

We created the *hermanamiento* when Padre Ignacio González headed up the new Committee for Community Development. The unforgettable, action oriented and beloved liberation theologian was part of the first delegation from Santo Tomás that visited Olympia in 1990. Since then, more than 30 people in ten delegations from your community have come to Olympia to share their histories, their perspectives, their skills and experiences with us. You've hosted eleven delegations from The Evergreen State College, and eight community delegations from greater Olympia. You extend un-

> It was doña Olendia Duarte who, in thinking about the Evergreen students who've left Olympia after they graduated and decided to make their lives elsewhere, that they take with them what they learned in Nicaragua, organizing and making change, benefitting from the seeds you planted which have grown to produce positive results, multiplying their commitment to seeking justice everywhere. The struggles continue and we are indebted to you for what we've learned in Nicaragua...

We are also inspired by the beneficiaries of the Sandinista Revolution, who today are nurses and doctors, economists, accountants, teachers and professors, engineers, lawyers, authors, poets, etc. There are many "graduates" of the *comedor infantil* who now have professional careers that bring them a salary and deep pride from contributing to the progress of your beautiful country. You know who these members of your community are and we congratulate all of you for your successes!...
