Dear friends of Santo Tomás.

Hello! My name is Wyatt Warner, and I am writing directly to you from Santo Tomás, Chontales, Nicaragua where I have been living for the last three months. I'm so grateful to have inherited 33 years of hermanamiento (sisterhood) between Santo Tomás and our TSTSCA community in Olympia-made manifest in the support and warm welcome I have received here. I have gained, through working with inspiring people in the programs established through this long-standing partnership, a deep hands-on appreciation of the amazing impact your support and contribu-

tions over the years has had-and continues to have—on this community.

I spend my mornings helping in the Comedor Infantil, the children's free lunch and cultural activities program. which serves a free meal to 130 kids every day! For 30 years, you and TSTS-CA have helped to fund this program, as well as the attached public library which provides educational enrichment for all generations in this community!

I also volunteer in a new program that began with start-up funding from TSTSCA, called Paso a Paso/ "Step by Step". It is a free rehabilitation center that helps people with disabilities-the only such program in Santo Tomás. Here people have access to occupational therapy,

physical therapy, equine therapy, speech therapy, and talk therapy. The success of this program has thrilled not only the working volunteers and staff, but also families throughout the community who eagerly share success stories: that their mother has improved her mobility, or their sibling has developed self-confidence and blossomed as a result of the therapy

they received through the program.

One of the most important and far-reaching of the TSTSCA-funded programs is the Programa de Becas/ university scholarship program. It's heartwarming to see our 'becados' returning after 5.5 years of study and giving back to the community, like my friend Walkiria who is the physical therapist at *Paso* a Paso. Giving back to the community is a deeply cherished value here in Santo Tomás. The 21 current becados are a tight community, and this year they threw a party for 200 children and included a small gift for each one. These scholarships have benefited 52 scholars since 2010 in wide ranging fields such as medicine, accounting, engineering, teaching,

business administration, and environmental science.
